


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WA-HIADMINISTRATION

STUDENT GOVERNMENT

Washington's student government fills an important role in the high school, both as a leadership development program and as an effective student lobby. It consists of the Executive Council, the General Council, the Cabinet, and the class councils from each of the four classes.

All legislative powers of the Associated students of Washington High School are held by the Executive Council but are subject to the approval of the principal. New officers for the positions of president-elect, vice president, secretary, assistant treasurer, and assistant publicity manager will be elected in January for the spring term and in May for the following year.

The General Council is headed by the student body president-elect and consists of representatives from each each reg class. Its purpose is to carry out committee work and maintain communication between the Executive Council and the student body.

The presidents of all chartered clubs and the vice president of the Executive Council compose the Cabinet. The Cabinet acquaints the clubs with the regulations governing high school organizations and coordinates club activities.

Class Councils hold the power and responsibilities of organizing class activities including the traditional dances. Class officers serve full year terms.

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

Washington's Administrative Policy

Taken from the Student Rights and Responsibilities Handbook

Standard of Conduct

The Board of Education seeks to assure a climate in the schools which is appropriate for institutions of learning and which assures the safety and welfare of personnel and students. A student whose presence is seriously detrimental to the best interests of the school may be suspended or expelled in accordance with administrative rules and procedures established by the Superintendent. A suspension is merely a device to bring the parent, student, and teacher together to attempt to solve a student problem. Failure to comply with rules for the government of the school, pursue the prescribed course of study, or submit to the teacher's authority are grounds for suspension or expulsion.

Freedom of Expression on School Grounds

Freedom of expression is a constitutional right. It is guaranteed in the schools within a context which recognizes other basic rights of the individual student, including the right to pursue one's education without disruption.

The exercise of freedom of expression shall include the right to distribute, receive, and wear buttons, armbands and other badges of symbolic expression. Bearing the responsibility of these rights, however, the students shall not distribute or display

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materials which are libelous, obscene, or which create an immediate danger or physical disruption of the orderly operation of the school. Furthermore, students shall not distribute or display materials of a commercial nature, and students shall obtain the authorization of school authorities prior to engaging in activities which solicit student financial contributions.

Student Participation in School Affairs

The Board of Education views student participation in school affairs as an extension of the educational process. This district will encourage students to participate through planned programs and procedures in the government of the school and in curriculum evaluation. Students have a right to opportunities for meaningful participation in school affairs, especially in the following ways:

1. Organized arrangements for communications between faculty, student, and administrators to discuss substantive school issues on a regular basis;

2. Student government so organized as to provide constructive participation of students in school matters;

3. Cooperative establishment of an editorial policy for the school newspaper;

4. Student involvement in the evaluation

and modification of school rules and a mechanism for the hearing of student grievances;


5. Student participation in curriculum evaluation and instructional planning on a regular basis.

Student Clubs

All clubs shall operate according to democratic procedures and shall not discriminate on the basis of race, sex, religion, or national origin. Clubs which function within the school must be chartered by the Executive Council, be approved by the principal, and be supervised by an adult supervisor. The clubs shall be either service, honorary, or special interest clubs, meaning respectively that the club provides a service to the school or community, grants membership to students on the basis of special achievement, or provides experiences supplementary to educational programs.

Clubs which are intended to promote any one religion shall not be chartered. Membership in any interest or service club shall be open to all students. Members may not be selected by vote of the membership.

Attendance Policy, Graduation Requirements

No student will be allowed to return to class after an absence without an admit slip. Students will fill out their own admit slips, giving the date, time, and reason for their absence. After three slips have been accumulated, copies will be sent home to the parent or guardian.


When a student has accumulated excessive absences, he may be withdrawn from class by the administrator upon referral from the class teacher. At this point in time a student, teacher, parent, counselor and administrator conference must be held.

Students may appeal removal from class because of accidents, prolonged illnesses, or other causes of lengthy absenteeism.

Students who become ill during the day must not leave the building without being excused from the office. No student is ever permitted to go home during the day without permission from the office and from home.


